

Is "Work" a Four-Letter Word?

An old song from many years back spoke about the harshness of working on the railroad. One phrase in the song summed up the rewards for a day of hard manual labor. It said, "another day older and deeper in debt!" Such a song probably reflected the sentiments of the laborers but did not do much for morale. Another song I first heard from the movie, "O Brother where art Thou", called "The Big Rock Candy Mountain", takes the sentiment even farther. This old-timey song about the hobo idea of paradise spouts; "There ain't no short-handled shovels. No axes, saws, or picks. I'm going to stay where you sleep all day, where they hung the Turk that invented work in the Big Rock Candy Mountain!" Now that phrase is even more disparaging about work! But what does the Bible reveal to us about our occupations?

God must be interested in our work...because He works. The first sentence of the first chapter of the first book of the Bible reveals this truth. The very first proclamation about God in his written Word reveals his divine craftsmanship. God is constructing. He is creating something useful and meaningful. He is creating the heavens and the earth...and people. Many have argued about the length of time God spent on the job. Was it six twenty-four-hour days, or days that covered thousands of years? Whatever place these debaters come down on, there is always agreement about what God was doing at the time....he was working.

We do not have to read much further in Genesis to find Adam at work too. Some have seen all labor as part of the curse, but Genesis 2:15 shows that it was part of God's design for mankind. It states that "The Lord God took the man and put him in the Garden of Eden to work it and take care of it." God gave Adam something meaningful to do while he was in the garden. What Adam was doing was significant, it was not just a frittering away of time.

Our work is also meaningful to God because he seeks to guide every aspect of our daily activity. Since our work is of interest to God, it warrants our interest as well. Being a Christian means being a Christian all the time. Christianity is not merely a Sunday affair. Christ wants to invade every room and corridor of our lives and that surely includes our occupations. For many, labor is something to be avoided, discouraged, or even despised. A winner of the Publisher's Clearing House fortune once said, "I'll never have to work again!" It's as if the perfect life would have to be void of work to be "perfect". This attitude does not hold with the view that we get in Genesis. In the Bible, God gives work to man who is sinless (at the time), and lives in a perfect environment. Meaningful labor was part of the plan.

The word "meaningful" is a key word to focus on when we think of our work. We don't have to be convinced that we need a job in this life. The bills in the mailbox are constant reminders that work is necessary, but how do I make my work meaningful? One way is to see our jobs as an opportunity to share Christ with others, but evangelism is not the only reason work matters. We can also bring glory to God by offering him what we do each day on the job. Whether we are in a field, behind a desk, under a hood, or starting an IV in a patient, we are fulfilling one part of our calling as followers of Jesus. In I Corinthians 10:31 Paul states, "So whether you eat or drink or whatever you do, do it all for the glory of God."

We are to bring glory to God in whatever we do in life. The hours and days of labor are such a large chunk of life. That time and effort has to be part of God's transforming work in us. So, if we take this attitude to work, we may begin to sense God's pleasure in our labor, and that may cause us to actually find joy in what we do. If we can see how our work is contributing to the lives of others, and we do it with a Christ-like spirit, we can start feeling a sense of "calling" even if our job seems mundane. When that happens, we will know that we are not just clocking in hours to get a paycheck. We will be fulfilling one of the reasons we were put on this earth, and we will feel The Father's smile.

The National Day of Prayer is observed annually on the first Thursday in May. This day of observance, designated by the United States Congress, asks people "to turn to God in prayer and meditation."


HISTORY of NATIONAL DAY OF PRAYER

In the early 1950s, an evangelical movement called for Congress and the President to proclaim a National Day of Prayer. The movement grew and a young leader, Evangelist Billy Graham, led services for approximately 20,000 on the steps of the Capitol on February 3, 1952. Later that year, Congress proclaimed a joint resolution for a National Day of Prayer. President Harry S. Truman proclaimed a National Day of Prayer to be observed on July 4, 1952. Each year since that date, Americans have observed the day in their own way. The observance moved to the first Thursday in May by President Ronald Reagan and has been proclaimed each year since.

As a Nation, presidents and government officials have called for national days of prayer or thanks intermittently since before the country's existence.


- July 20, 1775 The Continental Congress issued a proclamation recommending "a day of public humiliation, fasting, and prayer" be observed.
- In 1795 George Washington proclaimed a day of public thanksgiving and prayer.
- May 9, 1798 John Adams declared this day as "a day of solemn humility, fasting, and prayer."
- March 1863 On March 3, Abraham Lincoln signed a Congressional resolution, during the Civil War, which called for April 30, 1863, as a day of fasting and prayer.





Monday, May 31 - Memorial Day

Memorial Day, formally known as Decoration Day, is a federal holiday and falls on the last Monday of May. The date of the Holiday changes each year but always remains on a Monday.

History of Memorial Day

The history of Memorial Day dates back to the American Civil War. It started as an event to honour soldiers who had died during the war. It is said to be inspired by the way people in the Southern states honoured the dead. The original national celebration of Decoration Day took place on 30 May 1868. There was over twenty four cities and towns across the United States that claim to be the birthplace of Memorial Day. Waterloo (New York) was officially declared the birthplace of Memorial Day by President Lyndon Johnson in May 1966. In the late 19th century, the holiday (previously known as Decoration Day) became known as Memorial Day and was expanded to include the deceased veterans of all the wars fought by American forces. Originally, the holiday used to be celebrated on May 30, regardless of the day of the week that it fell on. In 1968, the Uniform Holidays Bill was passed and as a result the day changed.

Traditions of Memorial Day

Traditionally Memorial Day is viewed as a time of honour and remembrance. Throughout the United States it is common to visit cemeteries, particularly military ones, and decorate graves of the deceased with flowers, small flags and wreathes. On the United States Capitol Building's West Lawn, a Memorial Day concert is held annually and is broadcasted live around the country.
