LESSONS FROM A DITCH

Years ago, I was picking up trash as part of a community beautification project. One of the young guys from our church was with me. As we foraged the ditches for litter, Scott noticed a strange sight. There in front of us was about a dozen eggs laying in a curve. Before I could filter my thoughts, I blurted out; "someone must have thrown them out of a car". That's a far-fetched explanation when you realize that none of the eggs were broken. They lay perfectly formed beneath a canopy of brown Johnson grass.

How did so many eggs end up in a ditch unbroken? The answer was only twelve inches away. There under thicker camouflage was a large red hen who silently stared ahead as she lay on another batch of eggs. It became clear to us that we had finally answered the age-old question of why the chicken crossed the road. Chickens lay eggs all the time, but why did she pick a ditch in a curve to nest? A place where cars reach blinding speeds, and can veer off the road in a stray moment?

The hen belonged to a fellow we all knew, but before I could alert him to that vulnerable maternity ward, I thought about the scene in a different way. I became haunted by the thought of chicks hatching and wandering onto a deadly path. It was not the thought of a chicken being killed that bothered me. One look in my freezer will dispel any deep convictions you may think I have about dead chickens. Instead, it was the presence of innocence and vulnerability nestled near danger that struck me. Helpless life could be at the mercy of speeding cars and roaming dogs.

During VBS I watched children flow out of pews and make their way to special places where they could learn, play, and sing. I looked at their eyes as they were taught simple object lessons about eternal mysteries and wonders. They were listening, they were absorbing...they were trusting. They live in a world that is so big. It moves so fast and the young are defenseless.

As a church family we are on a joint mission with the parents of our congregation. What can we do to provide not only physical safety, but spiritual safety as well? One of our responsibilities is ATTENTION. We should be mindful of the opportunities to teach them truth while they are with us. We must be aware of their potential...not just their "cuteness".

We also have a responsibility for INFLUENCE. It is not enough that we tell them the truth, but that we live the truth as well. Their concepts of biblical manhood and womanhood will be shaped not only by their family, but by their church community as well. Probably the most important responsibility we have for the vulnerable young among us is PRAYER. The Lord is the ultimate guardian of these young lives and he must be trusted. We must pray that their hearts will be warmed and open when they hear the Gospel and finally understand that it is about them, not just about the heroes of the Bible. Pray that when the Gospel gets personal, they will say "yes"!

LIFE magazine once had a picture that has stuck in my thoughts. It was a black and white photograph of eight or ten men in a circle. The picture was taken above their heads, looking down as they had extended their arms together. In the center of that circle was a baby who was being held by the right hands of all the men. The father was part of that circle, as were uncles, cousins, grandfathers and friends. They were all listening as the father spoke about his dreams for his son, and pronounced blessings over the child in their presence. As a church family we are part of a similar circle, and every child in this congregation should be in the center of that circle being baptized by our attention, influence, and prayers. Yet, as we do, we are thankful that the Heavenly Father also extends his invisible hand to hold these tiny lives, these vulnerable innocents, close to his heart.

Effective July 12, YCM will change the client shopping procedure. Clients may enter the lobby of YCM facilities. Those who have not had a COVID vaccine must wear a mask when entering the facility. If at all possible, only one person representing each

household should enter the building. All clients will be asked to complete an application to help update our files.

After files are updated, clients will be asked to review a list of food items in the pantry. Clients will select food items for their household and this list will be delivered to a volunteer shopper in the warehouse who will shop for the client. When the volunteer shoppers have completed shopping for the household, the client can drive up to pick up their food.

From Beth at the center: EMERGENCY FOOD BOXES/BAGS

YCM will be supplying emergency food boxes/bags to the community through August 21, 2021, every Wednesday from 10:00 a.m. until 11:45 a.m. at the Yadkinville Ministry Center and every Saturday from 10:00 a.m. until 12:00 p.m. at the East Bend Ministry Center. These boxes will be available as long as the pantry can sustain the boxes and service our regular clients with food items. This program will be discontinued when we can no longer maintain sufficient food supplies. These boxes will contain basic items to supplement family food supplies. The items will vary depending on the food stocked in our pantries.

To participate, a person presents at the ministry center and requests an emergency food box. A person is not required to be a client to participate. Please share this information with anyone who may need this service.

Overall for June, 222 Clients were served representing 592 family members. Thank you for your support and thank you to those who volunteer.



Speaking about the Bible, President William McKinley: "The more profoundly we study this wonderful Book, the better citizens we will become, and the higher will be our destiny as a nation."

July 4 - The day we Americans celebrate our Declaration of Independence from Great Britain.

John Adams writes to his daughter about the first celebration:

"John Adams to Abigail Adams 2d

Philadelphia, July 5th, 1777

My dear Daughter

Yesterday, being the anniversary of American Independence, was celebrated here with a festivity and ceremony becoming the occasion.

I am too old to delight in pretty descriptions, if I had a talent for them, otherwise a picture might be drawn, which would please the fancy of a Whig, at least.

The thought of taking any notice of this day, was not conceived, until the second of this month, and it was not mentioned until the third. It was too late to have a sermon, as every one wished, so this must be deferred another year."

He goes on to describe the day's events that continued on with ships and boats, "At three we went to dinner, and were very agreeably entertained with excellent company, good cheer, fine music from the band After this, two troops of light-horse, raised in Maryland, accidentally here in their way to camp, were paraded through Second-street, after them a train of artillery, and then about a thousand infantry, now in this city on their march to camp from North Carolina. All these marched into the common, where they went through their firings and manoeuvres; but I did not follow them. In the evening, I was walking about the streets for a little fresh air and exercise, and was surprised to find the whole city lighting up their candles at the windows. I walked most of the evening, and I think it was the most splendid illumination I ever saw."

The celebration continued to grow and spread over the years. In 1783, as peace returned to the nation in the aftermath of the Revolutionary War, North Carolina's governor Alexander Martin became the first governor to issue a state order to celebrate The Fourth of July. The Moravians of Salem heeded this and first celebrated the Forth that year with church services, music and a torchlight procession through town (Now Winston-Salem).

Almost a hundred years after the Declaration was written, Congress first declared July 4 to be a national holiday as part of a bill to officially recognize several holidays, including Christmas. Further legislation about national holidays, including July 4, was passed in 1938 and 1941.

Happy Fourth of July. Celebrate our Freedom. Fray for our country.
