Christmas Hope

During the 2008 presidential race, John McCain was asked by *Time* magazine to share his "personal journey of faith". In this article, McCain shared a powerful experience he had while he was a P.O.W. in Vietnam:

"When I was a prisoner of war in Vietnam...my captors would tie my arms behind my back and then loop the rope around my neck and ankles so that my head was pulled down between my knees. I was often left like that throughout the night. One night a guard came into my cell. He put his finger to his lips signaling for me to be quiet and then loosened my ropes to relieve my pain. The next morning, when his shift ended, the guard returned and retightened the ropes, never saying a word to me.

A month or so later, on Christmas Day, I was standing in the dirt courtyard when I saw that same guard approach me. He walked up and stood silently next to me, not looking or smiling at me. Then he used his sandaled foot to draw a cross in the dirt. We stood wordlessly looking at the cross, remembering the true light of Christmas, even in the darkness of a Vietnamese prison camp."

The picture of McCain wrapped tightly in a contorted ball of torture, and the callousness of his captors to his suffering, exposes the darkness of the human soul. But everything shifts when the picture moves to the dark stillness of one night, when a guard's conscience was stirred by the Holy Spirit. As he releases his tangled prisoner for a moment of respite, everything shifts. Light begins to glow when a sandal shapes a cross in the dirt. The power of the manger and the cross have entered behind the Enemy's lines. The glimmer of grace has once more penetrated the thick darkness of sin.

This story is a vivid illustration of the hope found in the Christ of Christmas. Without the manger of Christ's birth, and the cross of Christ's passion, the world would still be smothered in the bondage of cruelty and hatred. The soft picture of the Nativity revealed through contemporary decorations cannot convey the ultimate battle that was waged during the arrival of Christ. It was a battle for every soul that has ever lived. The birth of Jesus was a frontal assault on the spiritual darkness of this world. I John 3:8 states, "*The reason the Son of God appeared was to destroy the devil's work*". It's that simple: Christmas marks an eternal victory over the forces of evil.

In the midst of these difficult days, despair and depression have become more common. Yet as Christians, we must not become bowed and broken by the darkness around us. Instead, we must hear the bells of Christmas, and trust The Message more than ever. We must all live in the presence of Emmanuel, the power of the Resurrection, and the promise of Christ's return. Let us not allow the anxious spirit of this age, and the dismal news around us infect our souls. Let us stay convinced that our hope in Emmanuel is well placed.

Only six months after the carnage of the Battle of Gettysburg, while a nation mourned its dead, Henry Wadsworth Longfellow penned the words to a classic Christmas poem. The final two stanzas read:

And in despair I bowed my head;
'There is no peace on earth,' I said,
'For hate is strong
And mocks the song
Of peace on earth, good will to men!'
Then pealed the bells more loud and deep,
God is not dead, nor doth he sleep.
The Wrong shall fail,
The Right prevail,
With peace on earth, good will to men!

At times it does feel like evil is winning. Cruelty and hatred have not yet been eradicated. We can tangibly feel the lingering attacks of our Adversary in the news of a globe gone mad. The world is on fire! Yet, every day, in the farthest reaches of this fallen world, the cross is still being drawn in the dust by faithful followers of Jesus Christ. Let us be diligent in this coming year to live in the power of such hope.

A Christmas Gift

When I was about 7 years old, what I wanted most for Christmas was a Baby Tender Love. Unlike most dolls of the day, she was soft and was the most lifelike doll to that date. She was a chubby baby doll with blond hair and was dressed in pink, and you could move her arms and legs. I could not wait for Christmas to come. This would be the best one yet!

Christmas day came, and I had everything a little girl could want; everything EXCEPT my Baby Tender Love! To add insult to injury, later that day my cousin Robin showed up for family Christmas with a Baby Tender Love. I was so jealous I could not stand it; both Santa and Mama had failed me, and Robin had my doll! I think that was the day my eyes turned green.

I had one last hope. My Daddy was coming to get me for his family Christmas. I told myself that I knew when he showed up I would have my baby doll, maybe Daddy would save my Christmas. I waited with anticipation, and was so excited when I saw the large package in his hand. I ripped into the paper as fast as I could, and found that he had gotten me a new olive green hard shell Samsonite suitcase. But when you fast, anoint your head and wash your face, that your fasting may not be seen by others but by your Father who is in secret. And your Father who sees in secret will reward you. Matthew 6:17

The practice of fasting is found throughout the Bible. The Children of Israel would fast when there was a time of repentance needed (I Sam 7:6), or when a large challenge was facing the nation (Ezra 8:22-24). Jesus fasted for 40 days before he began his earthly ministry (Mt.4:1-11), and the early church fasted in order to confirm the mission of Paul and Barnabas (Acts 13:2-3). Shelby's NOTE:

When I was growing up, my Dad's family talked about Old Christmas and certain things you should or not do then. My dad also made a point that between Christmas, New Years and Old Christmas, he and mom and I, together, would visit the shut-ins, sick, elderly and some less fortunate families who might not have much for Christmas. He would take a Treat Bag of Christmas goodies, stick candy, oranges and apples and nuts. Mom would take her canned goods and sometimes cookies. There was always a little wrapped gift for each person. The children were excited, the sick and shut-ins so pleased. It was very customary at that time, that when someone gave you a Christmas gift, you would give them one in return. The thing that touched me most in our visits was, when my dad handed the persons a gift, many would sadly say, "I don't have anything to give you." His reply was always the same, "It's from Santa Claus." The person would smile and nothing else said.

I did a little research to find out more about Old Christmas and share some of it with you.

Old Christmas - January 6

Why is it called Old Christmas Day? January 6th is called Old Christmas Day because calendars changed. The Julian calendar, which was in use from 46BC, was based on an incorrectly calculated solar year. The error only amounted to about 11 minutes annually, but over hundreds of years those minutes added up. By the time the error was detected --- and they had decided how to fix it --- it was the 16th century and the calendar was off by 10 days.

The solution was the system we use now, the Gregorian calendar. Part of the fix was to eliminate the 10 days that had 'built up'. In 1582 Pope Gregory XIII decided October 5 would be followed immediately by October 15. The date changed everywhere governments were inclined to listen to a pope.

Britain, and its colonies were not among those places.

It wasn't until 1752 that great Britain moved to the Gregorian calendar. By that time an 11 day jump was required to fix the error --- so they decided that in 1752 September 2nd would be followed immediately by September 14th. This meant December 25th came 11 days earlier,

Many English and Scots were emigrating to the Americas and settling in Appalachia. Some didn't know or refused to change to the new calendar. This meant for them, Christmas fell on January 6. Christians in Apppalachia started observing December 25 as Christmas. However, until fairly recently, Old Christmas was still celebrated in some rural areas of West Virginia. It's recalled in various traditions such as in the fiddle tune "Old Christmas Morning."

In Newfoundland, they sort of fastened Old Christmas to the 6th. Partly, out of tradition and partly because January 6th is Epiphany (the day churches mark the arrival of the wise men described in the Christmas story).

Regardless of origin, Old Christmas Day is a special day and comes with a set of customs, superstitions and even miracles and marked with festivities. Special cakes are made. Twelfth Cake is an old British custom. Traditionally 12 buns were baked, then taken house-to-house, one bun given at each house until all 12 were gone.

According to custom and of special interest to the children and maybe witness "Animals Pray or Talk" at Christmas. And the Cows would kneel down and pray.

Many of these practices have largely subsided in recent years. It still seems January 6th is the end of the Christmas season. Christmas lights and trees disappear and visible signs of Christmas retreat.

Some say it's bad luck to turn your Christmas light on January 7th.


