The Man Who Wrestled with God

I was at Billy Graham's retreat center in Asheville with several hundred pastors last fall. One night, Billy Graham's grandson shared some devotional thoughts with us all, and we were impressed. He seemed like a chip off the old block. You sensed a committed young man, passionate about Jesus Christ, and clearly gifted in ministry. You sensed that Billy's mantle had settled on his grandson.

That is quite a different comparison to a grandfather\grandson duo in the Bible, Abraham and Jacob, in the book of Genesis. Abraham was a man of tremendous faith. He became the father of the three main religions of the world, and he is credited with being the model used by Paul to explain salvation by grace, (Rom.4:13-15).

Unlike his grandfather, Jacob was most noted for his deception and manipulation of others. He seems impulsive and self-focused in his early years, and in so doing leaves a trail of tears and regret along the way. Much of his life is spent as a fugitive from his brother, Esau, whom he tricked out of their father Isaac's blessing. Jacob's life seems a far cry from his grandpas' legacy of faith.... but God still has plans for Jacob.

What use is Jacob's life to us today? Let me give you two quick suggestions:

First, like Peter in the New Testament, Jacob's faults, traits, and mistakes endear him to us, because we understand those temptations in the same way. We can identify with his wrestling match with God because we sometimes find ourselves "wrestling" with The Lord about His will and timing in our own lives. We wrestle with big questions and we may even have challenges in our faith overall. We may not be led to mimic Jacob's behavior, but we can often identify with his struggles to "fix" things our way, instead of seeking God's direction and surrendering to his will.

Secondly, Jacob's life also reflects on our Heavenly Father. The Lord would not let Jacob go, and even marked Jacob with a limp as a permanent sign of God's plan for his life and Jacob's dependence on God. It reminds us of the times during a spiritual struggle when the Lord has met with us, and we leave that experience with a limp of gratitude for His patience and grace, and with a stronger faith than we had before.

You know, if Jacob was here, what would he be like? I picture Jacob with a wild look in his eye. You can tell he is taking in everything around him in a detailed way, you just don't know his intention. You do know, when he leaves your presence, you check to see if your valuables are in place. He is not polished or poised. Jacob is neither a saint or a righteous role model early on, but God can still use him. God will use Jacob in spite of Jacob. That carries a great deal of hope for us. Despite our messes and mistakes, God can still use us!

Broken B4 God

At our 2024 Beach Retreat, our worship time centered around brokenness, particularly being Broken B4 God. We discussed four aspects of brokenness: (1) the broken world, (2) the broken self, (3) broken relationships, and (4) brokenness used by God. In our first worship service, we briefly discussed the reality that we live in a broken and sinful world, but we spent most of our time learning that, as Christians, discussion of brokenness are unhelpful if we are unable to cultivate compassion and vulnerability. In other words, we cannot have meaningful conversations about brokenness if we are not prepared to encounter brokenness with compassion and vulnerability. In our second worship service, we discussed the ways in which brokenness impacts our lives as individuals and our relationships by manifesting physically, mentally, emotionally, and spiritually. In our final worship service, we discussed how God uses us and our brokenness to draw us closer to him, to allow us to connect with others in meaningful ways, and to further His kingdom.

We are incredibly thankful to have had the opportunity to lead worship at our beach retreat this year, and we want to leave you with some questions from worship to think through as you read this newsletter.

- 1. What is the role of compassion and vulnerability in our lives as Christians? Why is compassion and vulnerability important, especially considering that we are all broken? How have you seen compassion and vulnerability impact your brokenness? Is there room for improvement in your ability to be compassionate and vulnerable?
- 2. What are some examples of physical, mental, emotional, and spiritual brokenness? What is the role of sin in brokenness? How can we recognize brokenness in ourselves and others?
- 3. What are some examples of brokenness in the Bible? How does the Hope of Christ impact the way that you see brokenness in yourself and others? How is God using you right now, even though you are broken? Is God encouraging you to meet the brokenness of your friends, family, and community with compassion and vulnerability?

We ask that God continues to use us for His glory and that He uses our brokenness to draw us closer to Him. We also ask that He help us to grow in our ability to be compassionate and vulnerable Christians, and we ask that He continues to put people in our path with whom we can share the Hope of Christ.
